Eyes Right?

Six years ago I transferred my health insurance from the U.K D.H.S.S., to the Greek I.K.A. a simple business for an E.U. citizen. I had no indication that I should need it but it was a reasonable precaution at my 78 years.

Last February my eyesight suddenly started to fail; one day I could read ordinary text and music, the next it was impossible.

Acting on my behalf, Lula tried to contact I.K.A., but they were either on strike or their telephone lines were jammed. We were not worried, believing cataract to be the cause of my trouble; that is easily cured these days. At last, in despera-

pital and within three days I was examined by specialists.

more serious macula as later confirmed by a private specialist to whom I was referred because he has that analyses and prints out a crosssection of the eye. It showed clearly the growth beneath the retina distorting it and destroying their focus.

Seven years ago this would have been incurable; I would have become blind. Today, though, a new treatment is available involving injections straight into the eye. So far after two injections into each eye it seems as though the deterioration has stopped.

For any of our readers not aware, it has been an incredible few weeks for Dr.Lionel. First came his eye problem, reported by himself here. Then, he had to move home. Now, admittedly this was just around the corner from No.1 The Plateia, Agios Ioannis to Lionel's Lair, The Street, Agios Ioannis, but moving is stressful at the best of times, let alone when you are 84 and almost blind. And then came the third calamity; his rush to hospital for major abdominal surgery

We thought we had lost him on that bleak Tuesday night, but the surgeon performed miracles, treating his ancient hernia, mending his intestine, cleansing him of growths. We wheeled him into a mixed ward, where he was to spend the next week. From day to day his strength returned and on the following Tuesday we drove him to his new home.

Since which time he has put on weight again, is now taking normal meals, is taking regular outingswithout a stick-and generally being almost the Lionel of old, but without the lump. He has even managed a couple of short pieces here, which he dictated to young Kostas.

What is more, his eyesight may actually have improved somewhat. Fingers crossed.

The medical staff in Corfu has been fantastic. Mr Christodoulos [surgeon] Mr Papadopoulos [eye

surgeon]] Mr Kaloudis [eye specialist in town] are beyond reproach; first class. It was reported in this magazine some weeks back that the new hospital is self-service. It is in terms of nursing and after-care. I can vouch for that personally [pinch nostrils pleasel, but this is owing to lack of funding for ancillary support rather than through any fault of individual staff. They came up trumps big time.
