A Friend now gone

Dorie (affectionately known as Dorie) Alice DARKE (Nee Ralph) was born on 17 July 1913 in London and passed away peacefully on 23 March 2014 at the grand old age of 100 years and 8 months!

She was a dear friend of mine and I wanted to write a few words in her memory and I hope that those of you who knew her will find them interesting.

Dorie had a brother Stanley and a sister Joan. Their father was

Augustus George RALPH , OBE; CBE; who married May Lamb Colsell. Their father was Deputy Chief of Police in London during the second world war and part of his duties was to accompany the King on various visits here and there. After the war he was sent to Athens, Greece, to head up the civil forces resisting the insurgence of the communists.

Dorie's parents eventually divorced and in time her father (known as George) began a serious relationship with the widow of a professor from the University of Athens. This lady had a large property and olive grove in the southern area of Benitses, known as Limeri, and when George retired they both spent several wonderful years at this idyllic property. She passed away in the 1950's and left it to George in her will. This was contested by the University but, after fighting this for many years in the courts, George was eventually successful and the property became legally his.

Dorie and her then-husband, Grenville Cock, also a high ranking British policeman, came from the UK to Corfu and lived

with George on this wonderful property. Dorie, who doted on her father, ran his household and his life . Grenville felt somewhat overshadowed by his rather gruff and stern father-in-law.

In the early 1970's Dorie, her husband and father moved to their spacious new home at St. Eleni, Kato Korakiana. Sadly, Grenville passed away late 1974/early 1975. He was cremated in the UK and his ashes are in the British Cemetery, Corfu.

In 1976 Dorie married Police Commander Norman John Horatio DARKE after a 'whirlwind' romance!

In 1980 George, at the grand old age of 96 passed away and was buried in the British Cemetery on 21 December 1980. In his absence Dorie and Norman spent the next twenty years happily in their lovely home. Norman, who was born in Portsmouth on 1 August 1915, passed away, at the age of 85, and was buried in the British Cemetery on 14 November 2000, near to his father-in-law.

I will go back to Dorie's brother Stanley and sister Joan. Sadly, in the UK in the 90's whilst Joan was out walking with her husband Ken they were both killed by a reckless driver who mounted the pavement. They had one daughter, Jennifer Baxter, who lives in the UK and has two children David and Sarah. Brother Stanley passed away in 2004; his wife passed away in 2007 and their only child Christopher Ralph lives in Australia with his wife Rosemary, an accountant, and their two sons Nicholas Stanley George (after his Great-grandfather) and Felix Christopher Henry. Nicholas, a video producer for

World Vision, travels the world's problem areas. Felix was accepted into Law earlier this year and practices as an advocate in criminal law, with a view to becoming a barrister. Both sons are very interested in their family history and viewed great-grandfather George as something of a hero marveling at the photographs of him with the late king. Felix treasures his great-grandfather's championship wrestling trophies; earned during his early days as a policeman. George's OBE and CBE are safely secured in the family safe and the remaining treasured heirloom is the portrait of Dorie's father Augustus George.

RALPH, OBE; CBE; personal friend to the King! This has hung in Dorie's home for many years and it was her wish that this portrait go to her nephew Christopher Ralph, and it will. It is presently in my possession and I am attempting to obtain an Export Licence from The National Gallery in Athens but, this being Greece, I am having to deal with a certain amount of 'red tape' before I can send it on its way. Australia will become the final resting place for this portrait of a strong man who led a very interesting; fulfilling and responsible life; his face is so full of character and strength and his eyes are most penetrating. Dorie was very fortunate to have such a charismatic father whom she adored and he, in turn, enjoyed so many years of closeness with Dorie after she joined him in Corfu.

But, luckily, Dorie was not left to fend for herself. She had the most wonderful next-door-neighbours in the form of Maria and her husband Napoleon Kaloudis. Suffice to say that for the past 35years dear Maria tended to Dorie's every need and, in her declining years, fed her; washed her and watched over her like a loving mother would do for her child. In fact, for the past 15years Maria spent each and every evening at Dorie's home; sleeping when she could in one of the bedrooms nearby and always on call in case Dorie needed her.

I visited Dorie on a regular basis and I would find her sitting on her bed all neat and tidy. Maria would place my flowers in a vase nearby and we would sit and chat for a short while. Dorie had a sharp mind and asked me often about Mary Lemis (widow of the former Honorary Irish Consul) and Lorraine from the Anglican Church. Mary visited Dorie just

days before she passed away. Her favourite colour was pink and she had the softest pink glow to her flawless cheeks. On the dot of 2pm each day, all year round, Maria produced a home-cooked meal for Dorie who had a very good appetite. I was there one day when Maria took Dorie's meal from the oven and it smelled so good I asked Maria if I could move in and be as well-fed as Dorie!

Each Christmas I would provide a small pre-cooked Christmas pudding and give Maria explicit instructions on how to warm it in the microwave oven; Dorie always looked forward to her Xmas puddings; chocolates and cards. She would also enjoy a home baked cake from her friends at the Anglican Church.

In early March of this year Dorie started to become very frail and it was evident that it was just a matter of time before she would leave us. On Friday, 21 March Lorraine from the Anglican Church, accompanied by Locum Chaplain Peter Jordon, visited Dorie and they prayed with

her. They recited the 23rd Psalm and, I am told, Dorie's last words were: **The Cross. Amen!**

She passed away, pain-free during her last three days, at 8am on Sunday 23 March and was buried in the British Cemetery on Monday, 24 March. She was taken from the mortuary straight to the cemetery, as was her wish. Her coffin was opened for a while; she was dressed in her favourite pink and I placed a single pink rose on her breast. It was her wish to be interred in her father's grave and there she now lies.

Our gentle Dorie, after a wonderfully interesting life, is now gone;. Maria has lost a mother and I have lost a friend but she is always in my heart and often in my prayers and thoughts.

Good night dear Dorie until we meet again. Rest in Peace.

Aunty Lula's Love-bites

Viennese Fingers

Ingredients

200g Butter
50g Icing Sugar (sieved)
200g Plain Flour (sieved)
2 tsp. Vanilla Essence

Filling:

100g Icing Sugar (sieved)
50g Butter
2 drops Vanilla Essence

Chocolate Coating

150g Chocolate (melted over hot water)

Go:

1. Place the butter and icing sugar in a warmed bowl and cream until the mixture is quite soft. Add the flour and vanilla essence and continue to beat until the mixture is fairly soft but smooth.

2. Transfer the mixture to a large piping bag fitted with a star nozzle. Pipe 7.5cm fingers on to a lightly greased baking sheet.

3. Cook at 180°C for 10 - 15 minutes or until they just begin to change colour. Cool on a wire rack.

4. Beat the filling ingredients together until they are smooth and creamy.

5. The chocolate can be put to melt at the same time.

6. When cool, sandwich the fingers together with the cream and then dip the ends of the fingers into the melted chocolate.

7. Leave to dry completely before storing.

Sporting Memories

From 1948 to 1958 I lived, first as a student and later as a teacher, in Wembley with a view of the Stadium, its imposing towers a mere two hundred yards from our front gate. Whenever my very busy schedule afforded the opportunity I took advantage of the entertainment being offered almost on my doorstep, mainly evening speedway at the stadium and a wide variety of functions at the Empire Pool at first, until in 1951 I became organist and choirmaster at the local church. Our vicar was always given complimentary tickets to events at the stadium and he passed them on to me - all except those for the F.A. Cup Finals! I saw many international matches and was among the thousands who admired and applauded the wizardry of Stanley Matthews. When there was nothing on at the stadium I often went with a fanatical Q.P.R. supporter friend and his family to their attraction when the team was at home and at other

times to support Brentford. In those days, before hooligan violence and vandalism polluted football, we often rubbed shoulders with fans of visiting teams.

There was plenty of friendly banter but not a trace of aggression. The presence of women and children kept coarse language away. My friend's wife and two sons, initially aged 7 and 13, always came with us, the boys entering through a separate turnstile charged three-pence each, and we had our afternoon entertainment for one shilling.

In summer academic holidays and Saturdays when I was not required to play for weddings I often went to watch cricket at Lord's or the Oval, both easily reached by train from Wembley. As a Middlesex supporter I went more frequently to the former where Dennis Compton and Bill Edrich were attracting great support with their batting and I also saw Don Bradman giving England fieldsmen a run-around in a Test Match. Too I saw Freddie Trueman and 'Typhoon' Tyson

hurling down their thunderbolts as well as being amused by the antics of Godfrey Evans, the Kent and England wicker-keeper.

Together with the Bedsers the great day at the Oval was the spin bowling of Tony Lock and Jim Laker and I regret that I was away on holiday, able only to enjoy the radio commentary of the B.B.C.'s inimitable John Arlott, when the Surrey 'Spin Twins' skittled out an entire Australian XI in an afternoon for a miserable two-digit score while I was sipping cider in the shade of an orchard behind a Norfolk farmhouse.

At the Wembley church I soon built up a large choir of twelve men and thirty boys. On my visits to the stadium I would often be greeted with, "Hello, sir," by a group of grinning youngsters. Although they were some of the best-paid choristers in the country I know that they never entered through the turnstiles and I wonder if the new stadium is any more boy-proof than the old one.

But getting back to our first encounter in Dassia, Lula & Paul had a number of properties to show us which they thought would come close to our “dream property” as indicated by the on-line forms we had filled in prior to our visit.

Of course we were looking for our “Shangri La” on verdant Corfu but it soon became apparent that it was harder to find than we imagined!

We thought we had found paradise in a tumbledown goat herder’s cottage and left Lula & Paul with the search to find the owner and to open negotiations on our behalf.

On our next visit to Corfu in Sept of the same year it was soon obvious that the cottage was beyond repair and actually required to be knocked down and re-built, which basically meant it was never going to be the same.

It was at this time that our friends suggested that maybe what we really needed was a plot of land and to design and build our own bespoke home?

It was obvious that Paul could see what we could not see ourselves, which was “we knew what we did not want but could not find what we really wanted”

So the search for a suitable plot of land was underway!

In Nov 2012, we were contacted by Ocay who had located a plot of land for sale close to the village of Agios Ioannis, it sounded just what we were looking for! So we made plans to return to Corfu in April of 2013.

April 2013 could not come quick enough but it did and we eventually arrived back on the island.

Lula and Paul had come up with several plots of land for my wife and I to check out but it was pretty plain from the outset that the first plot in the valley known to the locals as “Vrisi” was perfect for us and Paul knew it was before we did! We did check out other plots just to make sure we were making the right decision and it confirmed that we were.

Before we could enter in to any legal process we had to obtain our Greek tax numbers to allow us to proceed and open a Greek bank account to fund our purchase and hopefully the build, none of which would have been possible without the guidance of Lula & Paul. There was no way a couple of “newbies” like us with not even a smattering of Greek language skills could have managed the above.

So Lula & Paul began the long process of contacting the owners of the land and negotiated on our behalf and in June of 2013 my wife and I became proud Greek land owners thanks to the services of Ocay.

My wife and I returned to Corfu in July and arrangements were made for us to meet up with Nikos, a Mekanik? (architect) and in no time the design we had in our heads was soon turned in to artists impression’s and architect’s drawings.

Once the drawings were submitted it was just a matter of waiting and waiting until planning permission was finally granted in Feb of 2014, wonderful.

This is where Lula and Paul really came into their own, with several properties already constructed, their skills, experience & contacts proved invaluable.

The land was cleared and the long awaited construction was underway!

And as they say “the rest is history”

Paul keeps both of us updated with regular reports and plenty of photographs as the build progresses.

We are planning to visit the village and the build of our home with our grown up children and our Grandchildren at the end of April early May 2014, (so by the time you are reading this we will have been and gone) to allow our family to hopefully share and enjoy the Corfu experience.

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Fleshpots Of The North

This year, here in Greece, we celebrated Pascha (Easter) at the same time as the West and it also coincided with the Jewish festival of Passover. You may have seen, as I did, a short film on the BBC on-line showing the 'rocket celebrations' in Chios where homemade missiles are directed at rival churches, with points awarded for clear hits.

We cannot claim anything so exciting here in Episkepsi, however many people attend the church at midnight to 'see-in' Easter Day, candles are lit, greetings are exchanged and this year some €1,000 worth of fireworks were discharged. Given the current plight of the Greek economy I think this shows a healthy disregard for the German bankers who apparently believe they own, if not control, Greece and an attention to the real priorities of life.

The village has also acquired a canon to repel EMU and Ministry of Finance inspectors and this also let rip. Being well placed up the mountain we are able to see the fireworks from many other places; Roda, Sidari, Kerousades, Acharavi. The fireworks of other village are, without exception, lit early and whilst this might interrupt the priest's invocation of the Risen Lord; we get to see a number of displays at no cost.

As midnight strikes the bells are rung, fireworks ignited, candles lit and we all exchange greetings. Chronia/Xronia polla, which is in regular use for birthdays, hi-days, holidays and in some cases simply surviving 'til Saturday, Kālo Pascha/Pasxa and also Christos/Hristos Anesti (Christ is risen), the

reply to which is Alithos Anesti (He is truly risen/He is risen indeed).

Early in my time here I misheard the responses and believed, in ignorance, that the priest had said *Christos/Hristos arresti* to which the only response I could think of was Habeas Corpus, in other words from the Latin 'release the body'. I thought this might have something to do with the arrest of Jesus by the Roman authorities or conversely after the crucifixion when it as discovered that the body of our Lord was missing from the tomb. I now know better.

Having wrung many hands, exchanged greetings, kissed countless stubbly cheeks and struggled without success to keep alight a Pascal candle in a high wind we repaired home for a glass port of a slice of home-made rich fruit cake. However the traditional and observant Greeks break their Lenten fast with *Mayiritsa* which is, in its simplest form Lamb's liver soup, however but can become a sort of liquid haggis with the addition of spleen, kidneys and other offal and of course every district, if not every family, has their own particular take on this late nite treat. For me the fruit cake suffices.

One traditional greeting/toast at a Greek wedding is *May you live*. As I type this, mid-morning on Easter Sunday, shotguns are being randomly discharged around the village. Whilst in the UK this form of celebration of life itself and the joy of the Risen Lord would be frowned upon if not actually prevented by our friends of the health and safety persuasion. Whereas here these explosions, for me, are an exemplar of the Greek attitude to life and that this proud nation will survive the current,

though passing, economic cruelties.

In Greece the week following Pascha is heavy with 'Renewal Days', thus Renewal Deftera (Monday), Treetee (Tuesday) etc., but interestingly not Friday. We however will be celebrating 'Easter Monday' in the usual and traditional fashion by going to the races at Ermones, as described in an earlier piece. Having enjoyed a compulsory 4-day break after the Grand National the visiting jockeys will, no doubt, be itching to get back into the winner's enclosure. I heard yesterday that some 800+ guests had arrived in a hotel in Acharavi, I guess we can say, for good or ill, that the 'season' has well and truly opened. Roll on the 1st November. To adapt John Ebdon 'if you have been thanking you for reading'.

Now for the answers to a previous quiz: Perhaps unusually for an aristocrat, both then and now, Lord Rosebery was an enthusiastic supporter of football. Such was his dedication to the sport and his involvement in the development of the game in Scotland that, on occasions, between the late 1880s and the late 1940s the Scotland football team wore Rosebery's racing colours as the national shirt.

The traditional dark blue were the colours of Queens Park which represented Scotland in the first international. However Rosebery was such an influential figure in Scottish football at the time, serving as Honorary President of both the Scottish Football Association and Hearts of Edinburgh, that his racing colours of primrose and pink were worn.

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Most notably when Scotland defeated England 4-1 in 1900 and Rosebery famously said 'I've never seen my colours so well sported since Ladas won the Derby' (in 1894).

For those who might be interested Rosebery's colours will be Scotland's change kit for the UEFA Euro 2016 qualifying matches.

We went for a coffee, and I found out that the couple were very keen walkers who run a website (Traildino) which pulls together hiking trails from all over the world and put them into a single informative e-location. The Corfu Trail already appears on this site, and I hope and imagine that as a result of our 'accidental' meeting it will feature more prominently.

For those of you who live here and are interested, 'Public' is at Solari, on the very commercialised section of the main road out of Corfu Town to the north (21, Paleokastritsa Road) near the banks. It has its own (small) parking area, and the staff are very pleasant too.

To which the Blonde replied, 'We're not stupid, you know. We're going at night!'


IN A VACUUM: A blonde was playing Trivial Pursuit one night. It was her turn. She rolled

Complimentary Relaxation methods during stressful times

Coping during these times of stress and crisis can be very difficult. Can using complimentary or alternative relaxation and healing methods be the answer? One such very useful and simple complimentary method is Reiki.

What is Reiki?

Reiki is a natural healing and relaxation method. Basically it is the laying on of hands and channeling of 'life-force energy' through a practitioner to the recipient. The recipient can be a person including oneself, an animal, a plant or even an object or certain situation such as a forthcoming test or exam, a social occasion etc.

Reiki originated in Japan and was brought to the Western world during the early 1900's. Reiki is now practiced all over the world and is widely used in hospitals and clinics in many countries.

How Reiki works.

We face problems when we do not have enough energy to carry out our life functions or when we, as energy systems, are out of balance. To enter the body the life force energy has to have channels or doorways, these are provided by Chakras, the energy centres of the body, with which we can receive the energy and spread it throughout the physical body and Aura, the subtle energy field around the body. A treatment is performed by the practitioner laying the hands on the body and initiating the energy to flow through their hands and into the client's body. This flow of energy may be felt by the client as any type of sensation such as heat, cold or vibration. During a treatment it is essential to cover as many areas of the body as possible even if a problem is located in any one part of the body. The Reiki energy is automatically directed to where it is most necessary for the healing process. A Reiki treatment supports the whole person - physically, emotionally, mentally and spiritually. A full client treatment takes about 60 to 90 minutes. Reiki can be administered very simply in all kinds of settings for example at home, a clinic or hospital, a classroom, almost anywhere. Of course the ideal situation is a quiet place with a relaxed atmosphere.

When we practice Reiki we relax, which allows the brain impulses to slow down to between 7 and 14 cycles per second known as alpha level brain waves. or even between 4 and 7 cycles per second known as theta level brain waves. An average active brain during everyday life operates from 14 up to 21 cycles per second which is known as Beta level. It is very important that the brain slows down because when the brain operates in lower frequencies the body can heal itself more easily and more quickly.

On the physical level Reiki can relax stressed muscles, decrease pain, accelerate the healing time of bones and wounds, burns and bruises and much more and can

assist in the healing process of more severe illnesses. The right and the left hemisphere of the brain become more balanced. The immune system is reinforced.

On a mental and emotional level anxiety and stress is reduced, a sense of well-being and happiness is increased and another level of relaxation is felt. On this level Reiki is ideal for releasing suppressed feelings and emotions from the past. At this degree of deep relaxation a rebalancing of energies can occur and the natural healing ability of the body is enhanced. The person becomes more intuitive, decisions are more easily made. Imagination and visualisation are enhanced.

On a spiritual level Reiki enhances a person's consciousness and spirituality giving the feeling of being enlightened and reborn.

How somebody responds to Reiki depends on their physical, mental, spiritual and emotional state

Reiki is a healing method that is suitable for anyone. Whether it is through treatments or as a Practitioner. It doesn't matter whether you are a complete beginner or whether you practice other complimentary or improvement methods. It is effective when used on its own, but can be combined with any other form of healing methods. What is required is a desire to learn and a willingness to do the practice.
