

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Saturday Walks

Saturday, 14 October: VATOS: Kortiraki and the Myrtiotissa Views (2 hours ** NEW). Meet at 19th Hole Bar, Vatos (beside the petrol station on the strip before the Golf Club entrance), 10.00 for 10.30 start. Lunch to be arranged. **NOTE:** A nicely varied walk with great views. Be warned - this is the last of the easy walks!

Saturday, 21 October. LOUTSES: Two Caves (2 hours **). Meet at the Anapaftiria Junction, far end of Loutsas, 10.15 for 10.30 start (no coffee). Lunch at Thomas Taverna, Old Perithia. **NOTE:** No severe up-hills, but very rough underfoot at times. Descent into the second cave is optional.

Saturday, 28 October. KAMARA: Environs of a Picturesque Village (1 1/2 hours **). Meet in Kamara Village parking, just after the square, 10.15 for 10.30 start (no coffee). Lunch at Arhontariki Taverna, Sinarades. **NOTE:** Bucolic walking on tracks, paths and small roads. One longish steep climb.

Saturday, 5 November. DAFNATA - STAVROS: The 'Vouno' and Pantokrator Church (2 hours ***). Meet at Kostas Bar, Dafnata, by the viewpoint, 10.00 for 10.30 start. Lunch at Aretis Place, Agii Deki Village. **NOTE:** We always do this walk in early November because of the autumn flowers.





So far, the villages on the list are Stavros, Sinarades, Vatos, Giannades, Makrades/Krini and Sokraki. All these villages meet the criteria, and some even possess a marked footpath network radiating from the settlement. Others flagged up for the future are Lefkimmi, Liapades and Old Perithia. But any property on or close to the Trail will be considered.

Currently, hikers overnight in locations recommended in the official Corfu Trail Guidebook, averaging five to six hours apart on foot. The available accommodation in these places is fully booked at peak times - a problem that Ocay Properties' new initiative aims to resolve.

Furthermore, providing accommodation in localities different from the ones currently recommended immediately creates possibilities for alternative schedules, such as for people who only wish to walk three or four hours per day, or for those who wish to take the Trail at a faster rate by walking longer daily distances.

THE TYPE OF PROPERTY that will be listed includes:

- * Small, easy to maintain village houses ideal for CT overnights or as longer-term holiday lets to get-away-from-it-all visitors, walkers or non-walkers.
- * Groups of cottages that could be serviced by an on-site or close-resident owner, for visitors as above.

- * Large old houses to convert as hostels for the visitors as above.
- * Existing businesses with studios/apartments.
- * Plots of land for development, possibly as eco-tourism projects.

All purchasers will, on request, be provided with a bespoke walking guide to the area (in electronic pdf format), including the adjacent sections of the Corfu Trail, and other non-Trail hikes in the vicinity. In addition, all buyers interested in renting to Trail-goers or other walkers will be placed on a database that will be sent to walkers wanting accommodation - a service that will be flagged up on the Corfu Trail website and in the official guidebook. The wife had a wooden leg and to insure it in Britain was £2000.00 a year.


When they arrived in Cork, they went to an insurance agency to see how much it would cost to insure her wooden leg.

The agent looked it up on the computer and said to the couple, '£39.00.'


The husband was shocked and asked why it was so cheap to insure here in Ireland because it cost him £2000.00 in England.

The Rock Concert

The patio was packed in Ipsos at the bar. British expatriates whom I'd rarely seen in my neck of the woods had come to listen to the music. I knew some of them from, probably, some lifetime ago. People who'd smiled at me vaguely, and disappeared from my perspective, now approached, kissed me on both cheeks and melted away into the crowd. A young Psycho-therapist sat down next to me and we talked until the band arrived: there were three guitarists, a drummer and a singer. amidst the roar of amplifiers there, one woman stole the show. Dressed in black, her blond hair short like a man she sang and danced, her voice enhancer gave her an air of howling in the dark. The deafening sounds of well known music numbed my brain. I felt lost in the music in the best kind of way. Somehow I stepped out of the crowd into a direct one to one with everything that's raw. The Singer howled and crooned alternately, her thighs and knees aquiver in true Presleyan style, her voice, now gravelly and raw like Janice Joplin, now screaming and choking in a musical orgasm at the top of the scale. She leapt straight up and down and shook her head, quivering to the rhythm. We were mesmerized! The lead guitarist kept with her, uttering melodies somewhere between Bach, Jimmy Hendrix and Dire Straits. My brain, fully engaged, began to feel something expressed for us all in howling, choking, weeping tones: our expatriate loneliness, far from home. So close, intense, we, as the audience, had grown, non Brits like the Dutch felt, for once, alien and strange. We Brits, as a rule, don't do closeness, but when we do, we do it well. The concert hit a nerve; the beauty of rock lies in the dream left to us when melody and rhythm become transcendent entity.

The Corfu Channel Incident Remembered

THE 22ND OCTOBER 2017 marks the 71st anniversary of the 'Corfu Incident', in which 44 sailors lost their lives when two Royal Navy vessels, Saumarez and Volage, hit mines off the shore of Albania while establishing right of passage through the Corfu Channel. The incident is commemorated at the British Cemetery in Corfu Town, where the Commonwealth War Graves Commission have provided simple engraved headstones on the graves of the twelve sailors whose bodies were brought ashore the next day. The names of 32 sailors whose bodies were never found are inscribed on a monument.

On the 60th anniversary of the incident in 2006, and speaking exclusively to this author, Saumarez survivor Bill Atkinson remembered the funeral service at the British Cemetery for those recent dead. 'I had lost everything. My locker was in the section of the ship which was hit, and all my possessions went down. I attended the burial in my overalls.'

W. E. B. Godsal (later a Royal Navy Captain) was on the bridge of the Saumarez when it hit the mine. 'It was a total shock,' he reminisced after the ceremony.

The incident sparked a long-running row between Britain and Albania, whose government refused to pay the compensation set by the International Court of Justice in The Hague. Diplomatic relations were restored only after the fall of the communist regime in 1991, when, in a deal which upset many of the survivors, Britain agreed to release confiscated Albanian gold in return for just over a million pounds.

But for the injured and relatives of the dead, this compensation was no compensation. Though the incident occurred in peacetime, those disabled and bereaved received no more than a normal 'civvy-street' pension. The compensation that was eventually paid to survivors and relatives, once the matter of the gold was settled, has been described as 'inadequate.'

'The government told us that these men were no different to those killed in the war,' said Doug Francies, who was on the crew of Saumarez and afterwards founded the Corfu Channel Association to assist survivors. 'Therefore, their dependents were not entitled to compensation, they said. But this was a peacetime incident! [1946 - Ed.] And the government refuted their own argument when they paid extra money to the widows of the Falkland War.' Mr Francies worked for many years through the Association to support the rights of those involved, and to bring together the scattered survivors and relatives.

Their shabby treatment is underlined by the indifference with which officialdom treated relatives of the dead at the time. The widow of Leslie Bevan, killed on the Saumarez, waited 36 years before any official person called. Winifred Winter, whose son Brian also died on the Saumarez, recalls that a young naval officer visited two days after they received the telegram. 'But I wasn't home so I couldn't speak to him, and he didn't come back. No-one else from any official body ever called back.' It was forty years later, through the Corfu Channel Association, that she learned from a shipmate that blast had killed her son instantly, and he had not suffered.

Even at the time, the government appears to have suppressed the news, perhaps embarrassed that a blatant attempt at gunboat diplomacy could have gone so disastrously wrong. Accordingly, they played down the incident into one of comparative insignificance, releasing to the media in dribs and drabs the barest details of a story which would normally have dominated the headlines. It was left to the media of Plymouth (home base of the Cruiser Squadron), which had learnt first hand from survivors, to broadcast the outrage throughout that corner of England, though it never received prominent coverage nationally.

THE TALE BEGAN in May 1946, when two cruisers, HMS Orion and HMS Superb, were fired on by Albanian shore batteries whilst steaming south through the Corfu Channel (the narrow point in the north east of the island where Corfu and Albania are only a mile or two apart), a recognised international waterway. It was subsequently decided by Whitehall that 'right of passage' should be established by example, and four ships, Mauritius, Leander, Saumarez and Volage, were sent to prove the point.

After a five-day stopover in Corfu, at 14.00 in the afternoon of 22 October, the ships set off on their mission. Rear Admiral Sir David Scott, a lieutenant at the time, was on board the Volage. This is his account of events:

'At 14.47 the silence on the radio telephone was broken by Mauritius ordering a routine alteration of course to port to bring us onto the final leg of our passage through the Channel. At the time I was looking through my binoculars at the Mauritius and the Saumarez, and I could hardly believe my eyes when I saw the Saumarez engulfed by a sheet of flame and black smoke. Then the radio telephone came to life again with a signal from the Admiral saying 'Volage, proceed to the assistance of Saumarez.'

'The Saumarez was burning fiercely and down in the bow to the extent that the water was actually lapping her foc'sle. She had many casualties, both killed and wounded, and scarcely had enough hands to take our tow. The tow was eventually passed, and we set off back towards Corfu at about four knots, towing Saumarez stern first, as her bow was so deep in the water she couldn't be towed ahead.

'All went well until at 16.15 an enormous explosion occurred at Volage's bow. The ship was brought to a stop, and for over an hour we fought the fires and the flooding. It soon afterwards became apparent that our boiler rooms and engine room were intact and that we could still steam. While we were deliberating on this, the whole ship shuddered and a sixty-foot section of the bow fell off the front and sank. Fortunately, the watertight bulkhead immediately behind the devastation held firm, but it was clear that the Volage could not steam ahead. However, we could steam astern, so once again we approached the Saumarez and we passed a tow over what remained of Volage's bow. Then, with both ships proceeding stern first, we headed back to Corfu.

It wasn't until shortly after one in the morning that we finally passed a line to Leander, who was anchored once again in Corfu Bay.'

David Mulcahy was on board the Saumarez, and helped rescue survivors. Also speaking exclusively in Corfu to this author, he submitted his story, never before told in this form to a newspaper:

'We were steaming behind the Mauritius when this terrible explosion occurred. The ship burst into flames and everyone was thrown into chaos. I was in the ASDIC compartment. We came to a standstill.

The foc'sle deck was awash and we had taken on a terrific list. Everything forrard of the bridge was a raging inferno. We knew that our lads in that part of the ship had no chance whatsoever.

'I was helping with the injured. It was pretty horrific, because some of them were so badly burnt. We rescued one lad out of the radar office. The mine had exploded 20 feet below the chair he was sitting on. He was flung out of his chair against the bulkhead and landed in a heap outside the radar office. He was on fire from head to foot. We got the water pump and put out the fire. We rolled him in a hammock. We couldn't put him on a stretcher, because we were afraid he would fall apart.'

This man required eight years of hospital treatment, including 30 orthopedic operations, his bones being burnt. He was discharged from the Navy in 1954 with only a disability pension, and not a penny compensation. 'He lost eight years of his life,' said Mulcahy. 'And for what?'

For a piece of ill-thought-out gunboat diplomacy patronisingly aimed at putting the Albanians back in their subservient place, that's what.

Volage Wreckage Found

IN 2009 RESEARCHERS IN ALBANIA discovered what they believed to be a section of the bow of the Volage. The wreckage was found 50 metres underwater in the channel between Corfu and Albania, where the peacetime mining incident took place.

'While largely obscured by mud, the remains show steel frames, electrical wiring, ammunition, stacks of ceramic plates, a British canteen and the remains of boots or shoes,' said James Delgado, president of the Institute of Nautical Archaeology, who was part of the international team of experts. The institute is a nonprofit research body affiliated with Texas A&M University.

The discovery was part of an effort to create an underwater cultural heritage map of the Albanian coastline and was coordinated by the Key West, Florida-based RPM Nautical Foundation and aided by Albanian authorities.

Plans were for the artefacts to be raised and analysed for confirmation, 'but the nature of the finds strongly suggest this was where HMS Volage hit the mine that tore off its bow,' Delgado said.

'The area of Volage blasted off by the mine was forward of the deck guns and included the forward mess, where some of the crew ate and slept, as well as storage compartments. The dishes, shoes and ammunition are evidence that fit.'

The wreckage, which lies off the Albanian port of Saranda, 185 miles (300 kilometers) south of Tirana, the country's capital, was initially examined by a remote-controlled submarine carrying three cameras.

Tickle Ties the knot

Over the past three articles I have instructed on how to tie three different "knots", the eagle eyed amongst you will have noticed that they fell under 3 different titles : *knot*, *bend* and *hitch*.

In this article I will try to explain the difference between a knot, bend and hitch

Except among seamen and scouts the word *knot* is ordinarily used as an all-inclusive term, covering the more specific use of knots plus bends and hitches. Even seamen and scouts find it hard to clearly define the terms *knot*, *bend*, and *hitch* because their functions overlap like the bowline knot and many other instances. In general, however, the terms may be defined as follows:

Knots. Knots are used to form eyes or to secure a cord or line around an object, such as a package. In other words, the line is bent to itself.

Hitches. Hitches are used to bend a line to or around an object, such as a ring, spar, or stanchion.

Bends. Bends are used to secure two lines together.

BLUE CHEESE SOUFFLE

[Serves 2]

INGREDIENTS: -

20g butter

15g flour

150ml milk

90g blue cheese

3 eggs separated

1 tablespoon leek thinly sliced and chopped

Half teaspoon of powdered mustard

Salt and pepper

GO: -

1] Grease a 15cm soufflé dish.

2] Heat the butter in a saucepan, add the flour and cook over a low heat for 1-2 minutes, stirring continuously.

3] Remove from the heat and gradually blend in the milk. Bring to the boil. Stirring all the time; continue boiling for 1-2 minutes until very thick.

4] Allow to cook a little, stir in the cheese, egg yolks, leek and mustard and season to taste with salt and pepper.

5] Whisk the egg whites with a pinch of salt, until peaking.

Using a tablespoon fold the egg-whites into the cheese sauce. Spoon into the prepared dish and bake at 180 degrees C for 35-40 minutes until well-risen and golden brown.

Serve immediately.
